

Some GCSE exams subjects have made changes to the assessable content or requirements for completion of the summer 2022 exam series. We anticipate this will continue to be updated. We will communicate all changes with students and parents at the earliest possible stage.

There has currently been **no changes to the format or duration of exams** but we do expect this to be reviewed and confirmed before September.

HOMEWORK EXPECTATIONS

There are 2 pieces of Science homework a week:

- 1. **Learning core questions** students should spend about 15 minutes a day learning core questions of topics they have previously studied. These are facts and are best learnt using flash cards, self-testing or the student being tested by someone they live with.
- 2. **Seneca assignments** this is an online resource used to test the students' knowledge of the topic they are currently studying. An assignment should take about 30 minutes.

ASSESSMENT OVERVIEW

All students will take a science course equivalent to at least 2 GCSEs. Pupils will either be entered for Combined Trilogy where pupils will receive 2 GCSEs or Separate sciences(triple science) where students will achieve 3 GCSEs – Biology, Chemistry & Physics.

Exam Board: AQA Combined Science Trilogy (8464)

Students taking Combined Science Trilogy will achieve two GCSEs. There are **six equally weighted linear exam papers**; two biology, two chemistry and two physics. Eachof the papers will assess knowledge and understanding from distinct topic areas. All exams will last for one hour fifteen minutes.

Exam Board: AQA Biology, Chemistry and Physics Qualifications (8461, 8462, 8463)

Students taking triple science will achieve three individual GCSEs; one in biology, one inchemistry and one in physics. Each of the six papers will assess knowledge and understanding from distinct topic areas. All exams will last for one hour 45 minutes.

HOMEWORK EXPECTATIONS

Homework will consist mainly of independent study continuing from classroom enquiry. Homework is an essential part of the GCSE as the coursework element of this course is demanding. Therefore, if you choose not to complete it you are instantly limiting your overall grade. You will be set one piece of homework a week, and you are expected to spend at least 3 hours completing this. Your homework will form a valuable part of your attainment and overall grade.

The outcomes from independent study can be used by teachers to identify common misconceptions and gaps inknowledge that can help plan subsequent lessons.

Independent research projects will also be set as homework to further deepen pupil's learning and develop linkswith contemporary issues. These will be set once a composite.

ASSESSMENT OVERVIEW

Exam Board: WJEC Level 1/2 Vocational Award in Constructing the Built Environment

The qualification is assessed continually throughout the two years. There are 3 assignments total, two of which are internally assessed, one unit which is completed in a controlled environment through an exam paper.

Unit 1 Safety and security in construction

Construction activities take place in many different contexts. Through this unit, learnerswill gain the knowledge and understanding to be able to plan how to minimise risk to their own and others health and safety in different contexts.

Unit 2 Developing Construction Projects

Through this unit learners will be able to interpret technical information to plan therefurbishment of a building, taking account of health and safety issues. They will useappropriate skills and techniques to carry out the refurbishment.

Unit 3 Planning construction projects

Through this synoptic unit, learners will use learning from the development of practicalskills and health and safety requirements of construction processes and gain the knowledge and understanding needed to plan straightforward built environment development projects.

HOMEWORK EXPECTATIONS

Homework will be set once a week. It will consist of independent research tasks and preparation for practical work. As the course is continually assessed it is an essential requirement that all homework tasks are completed. The final qualification will be assessed on practical and research tasks completed during lessons and as independent study and homework completion is an essential part of this process.

ASSESSMENT OVERVIEW

PEARSON LEVEL 2 TECHNICAL AWARD IN PERFORMING ARTS (ACTING)

The course is assessed over three components.

- 1. Exploring the Performing Arts (30% internally assessed) Over the course of this unit students will study three separate styles of performance. They will evaluate the different directorial intentions and requirements of each style and will be assessed through research tasks, practical workshops, and performance. They will participate in theatre trips and observations of existing repertoire developing an understanding of its stylistic features. Students will also study the range of roles and responsibilities required to develop professional performances.
- 2. <u>Developing Skills and Techniques in the Performing Arts</u> (30% internally assessed) This unit will research the role of the actor and comprises of workshops designed to develop skills as a performer. Assessment is primarily practical and is comprised of observations of practical workshops and a final performance in November of Year 11
- 3. Performing to a Brief (40% externally assessed) Students are set a brief by the exam board and expected to develop a 7–15-minute performance between January and May of Year 11. Assessment will comprise of a final performance and three written research logs evaluating the process of development and performance.



HOMEWORK EXPECTATIONS

A weekly knowledge retrieval quiz is set for homework on Class Charts and Microsoft Teams to consolidate student's key learning of the previous week. Extended pieces of writing and GCSE practice questions will also be set monthly via Microsoft Teams assignments.

ASSESSMENT OVERVIEW

The aim of the Edexcel course is to develop student's knowledge and understanding of specified key events, periods and societies in local, British, and wider world history. The course is designed to extend students' knowledge by studying new areas of content and by revisiting and deepening their knowledge of content studied previously at Key Stage 3.

Students will be set homework weekly that we be continuation of the work done in lessons, where students will be working on their final assignments. It is crucial that this work is completed and handed in to meet the deadline, otherwise this will have an impact on their overall grade.

ASSESSMENT OVERVIEW

<u>Unit 3 - Applying the Principles of Personal Training (Assignments)</u>

This unit is all about you, the individual performer, training to improve and enhance personal fitness for one activity/sport you participated in for *Unit 2: Practical Performance in Sport*. You must select one component of fitness and one method of training that is most appropriate, beneficial and engaging to improve your fitness for your chosen activity/sport. The ability to improve personal fitness is essential for sports performers. However, the same knowledge, understanding and skills are required to improve other people's fitness, and are essential for a number of progression opportunities in the sector, such as qualifications for sports coaches and personal trainers.

- Learning Aim A: Design a personal fitness training programme.
- Learning Aim B: Know about the musculoskeletal system and cardiorespiratory system and the effects on the body during fitness training.
- Learning Aim C: Implement a self-designed personal fitness training programme to achieve own goals and objectives.
- Learning Aim D: Review personal fitness training programme.

<u>Unit 5 – The Sports Performer in Action (Assignments)</u>

When a person exercises regularly, the body undergoes several short-term effects, such as increased breathing and heart rate. However, as their training progresses they'll start to notice that the short-term effects first observed change and they develop different long-term adaptations, such as a slower heart rate than before and a more controlled and easier breathing rate when they exercise. But why do these changes take place? What causes the change in physiological responses over a period of time? This unit will look at the training effects that occur when a person regularly participates in sport and physical activity over a given period of time.

- Learning Aim A: Know about the short-term responses and long-term adaptations of the body systems to exercise.
- Learning Aim B: Know about the different energy systems used during sports performance.
